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WORD OF THE PRESIDENT

Since February 24, 2022, the life of every Ukrainian has changed. Some have been affected more, some less, but there is no one who has not been affected by the full-scale war in Ukraine. In the first days of the full-scale invasion, Caritas, as a network of local organizations, was present and visible throughout the country. We provided a space where people could come for help, and a place for people to become part of the mission. People in need came to us for help. Others, looking for a place to channel their energy and help those in need brought us food, hygiene products, clothing and blankets. Both locals and those who were displaced joined together and served as volunteers - loading, sorting, packing, distributing. In some areas, we even had waiting lists to volunteer.

The fact that Caritas is a network of local organizations, each deeply integrated into their own community helped us respond quickly to the immense challenges that rose up in February 2022 - we had those horizontal connections that allowed us to quickly establish partnerships in the local community, with the local government, other NGOs and local businesses to address the needs around us. Eight years of experience in the full range of humanitarian response activities in the eastern part of the country, with a special focus on frontlines since 2014, very organically complemented our ongoing programs of social aid. These ongoing programs included systematic work with children, youth and families in crisis, the elderly, people with disabilities, displaced persons, and other people in need. Our goal and mission always remain the same: to find the best way to respond to the needs around us, in a way that builds human dignity and resilience.

Our expanded response to the humanitarian crisis unleashed by the full-scale invasion has been grounded in who we are as an organization: united by a mission to help those in need, and at the same time a community- a group of people who work together and support one another. I have often reflected in the past year that our society has been like a cloth woven together - each thread intertwined and knit together over many years. Our collective response as a country revealed that the cloth we have been weaving for many years now- building relationships, communities, working towards subsidiarity and decentralization, finding solutions to challenging problems, was well knit together. And it held up under great stress.

At Caritas we found that uniting around the mission of helping others has been life-giving not only for the beneficiaries but also for us, those who are helping others. Our mission, practical care for the good of the other touches the essence of how we were made – that at the core of our being we are all called to relationships and community, that we find our fulfillment in being gift to one another. As a result, when visiting our local organizations over the last year, there was a distinct sense of community and purpose, an energy to do good, and to keep walking forward in our mission, together. It is this mission and this community that will also carry us forward in the months and years to come.

We are sincerely grateful to everyone who has walked with us over the past year, to everyone who has donated, helped, prayed, hugged, and sent words of support. It was a year full of suffering and challenges, pain and loss, and difficult situations. At the same time, it was also filled with great solidarity, a great manifestation of hope, faith, love, and help for each other.

We believe that the war will come to an end. Every war comes to its end. In the meantime, we will keep praying and working, and continue to build our communities. During a visit a colleague from abroad asked me how is it that we continue to act, where do we draw our strength from. That answer has so many layers - it is prayer, it is community, it is in the mission, it is in the solidarity we received from abroad. And it is in a hope expressed through action. And that is something that we have all done together.

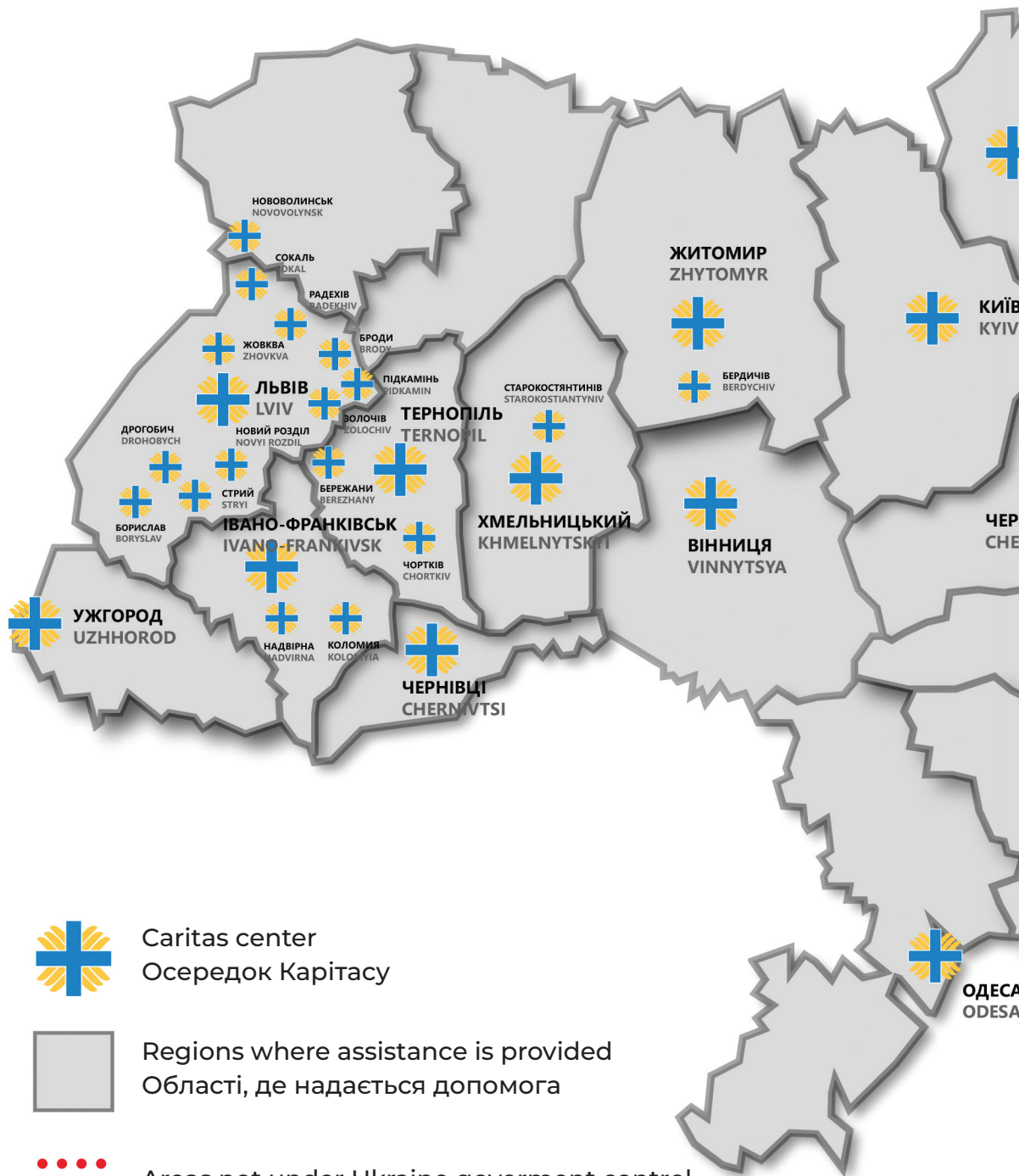

Caritas Ukraine has been assisting people in overcoming the consequences of war since 2014. This experience was very important on February 24, 2022. The main challenge for us was the scale of the response. We have to grow dramatically and, at a certain moment make a leap beyond our own capabilities, both in terms of the volume of humanitarian response and in terms of the spectrum of humanitarian services.



Caritas Ukraine is dedicated to working in solidarity with the people of Ukraine to provide vital assistance to the vulnerable families and communities, regardless of nationality or religion. Rooted in the Christian values, we uphold the dignity of the person in all of our programming, and work with local partner organizations across the country in a spirit of solidarity and collective good.

Caritas Ukraine is a network of 40 organizations — each based on a religious community or diocese — and 16 dioceses. Caritas Ukraine meets the international standards established for national organizations. The activities of both our diocesan and parish organizations must also meet these standards. It is through this commitment to quality and efficiency, as well as dignity, that we guarantee that the assistance we provide will be provided transparently, in accordance with Ukrainian law, without violations, and will comply, in particular, with the (humanitarian) principle of “Do no harm.”

PROGRAM ACTIVITIES



HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE – DIRECTLY ASSISTING 2.2 MILLION PEOPLE

Since the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, Caritas Ukraine immediately mobilized and expanded its programming to meet urgent and life-saving humanitarian needs facing people across the country, including recently liberated territories. The response took place quickly across Caritas Ukraine's 40 local organizations, as well as close to 500 parish hubs of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church.

PRIORITIES FOR EMERGENCY SUPPORT INCLUDED:

Safe shelter and accommodation

- **198** safe shelters
- Light repairs for **3,139** families' damaged homes, including support to winterize
- Cash assistance for **3,524** families to pay for rent.
- Fuel for **4,350** families
- Provision of **139,634** household supply kits

Food Assistance

- Provision of hot meals for **752,721** people
- Distribution of **399,586** emergency food packages, as well as **463,673** standard food packages (to last 1 month)
- Provision of **3,123** tailored food boxes for people with diabetes

Water, Sanitation and Hygiene

- **276 735** people received emergency hygiene kits
- **260 918** people received bottled of drinking water
- **14,394** people benefited from water delivered by truck
- **1,745** people benefited from restored water infrastructure
- **33,323** people received special hygiene kits for babies

Cash Assistance for 9,500 families to cover living costs



MEETING THE MOMENT:

- Caritas offices in Kolomyia, Lviv and Khmelnytskyi became major logistics hubs for receiving and distributing multi-ton shipments of humanitarian aid.
- Due to the occupation of Mariupol, the local Caritas first evacuated to Zaporizhzhia, where it actively provided assistance to war victims, and then relocated to Cherkasy. There, Caritas Mariupol continues to provide assistance to displaced families.
- In Eastern Ukraine, Caritas local organizations were involved in evacuating people to safe shelters in western areas.
- Caritas Ukraine mobile teams were active in rural areas, providing comprehensive assistance. This includes in eastern regions, delivering food and hygiene kits and drinking water to areas close to active combat zones, where people have been living without electricity, water and gas for almost a year.

Caritas Ukraine grew its humanitarian efforts from programming that started in 2014, following Russia's illegal annexation of Crimea and seizure of a part of Donbas. Over eight years, Caritas Ukraine had provided a range of assistance to support internally displaced persons across government-controlled parts of Donetsk and Luhansk regions. Caritas Ukraine coordinates closely with central and local authorities.



HEALTH

Delivery of emergency medical supplies to treat the wounded and war victims in health facilities.

- **78,561** overall health services provided to patients
- **9,076** diverse urgent medicine provided for health facilities
- **1,500** pieces of equipment for health care facilities
- **3,616** medical kits provided
- **1,588** grants provided to people to purchase medicine



PROTECTION

Caritas Ukraine expanded and integrated its programming to address the emotional wounds and trauma of war, including the life-changing impacts of loss, grief and displacement. Counseling, psycho-social support and other services included:

- **60,980** overall services provided
- **25,893** people who had been displaced and/or suffering from war-related distress or trauma, received targeted psycho-social support services
- **34,895** people received counseling
- **36,401** people received crisis counseling
- **75,000** parents, caregivers and children took part in events in **63** child friendly spaces



SOCIAL COHESION

Caritas Ukraine sought to engage community members in efforts to support peaceful relations and resilience. These efforts included activities and dialogue with displaced families and local host communities, and promotion of volunteer opportunities to strengthen that connection and engagements. The following took place this year:

events engaged 11,176 people

Training of Caritas staff members on conflict transformation and dialogue skills, accompany communities in conflicts, and mediate in situational conflicts during the distribution of humanitarian aid

108 parishes across Caritas Lviv, Kolomyia, Ivano-Frankivsk, Chernivtsi, Ternopil, Zhovkva, Stryi, Buchach, Kyiv and Drohobych have taken part in programs to help parishioners address problems in their communities

6,611

volunteers joined the Caritas Ukraine network

One third (**2,123**) of the new volunteers have registered to be permanent volunteers

Young people (**18-35** years old) account for **40%** of the volunteers

38% of the total number of volunteers are internally displaced

205 volunteers became Caritas Ukraine employees, engaged in distribution and support of humanitarian aid



LEGAL SUPPORT AND ADVOCACY



Even before the war, many vulnerable families and groups were unable to pay for much needed legal advice and advocacy services. Especially now, with heightened vulnerability, poverty and risk, the war has posed new challenges (destruction of property, loss of documents, loss of jobs, etc. Thus, providing free access to legal counseling and representation services is an extremely tangible and valuable assistance for Caritas Ukraine to provide.

CARITAS UKRAINE PROVIDED 8,842 LEGAL CONSULTATIONS ON THE FOLLOWING ISSUES:

- Restoration of property damaged, or of documents lost or destroyed, as a result of war
- Confirmation of status for internally displaced persons
- Registration of pensions, disability and social guarantees
- Regulation of labor relations (obtaining unemployment status, registration of termination of work with employers located in the temporarily occupied territories)
- Explanation of the rights to receive payments and financial assistance
- Information of rights relating to inheritance and family legal relations, payment and recovery of alimony, parents' rights to raise a child, obtaining status of "single mother"
- Information about renting and lease qualifications and obligations
- Representation of rights, including with regard to border crossings

Caritas Ukraine also supported 7,564 successful cases of representation of IDPs' interests before local communities, which will help people adapt to changed living conditions.



FINANCIAL SUPPORT (CASH ASSISTANCE)



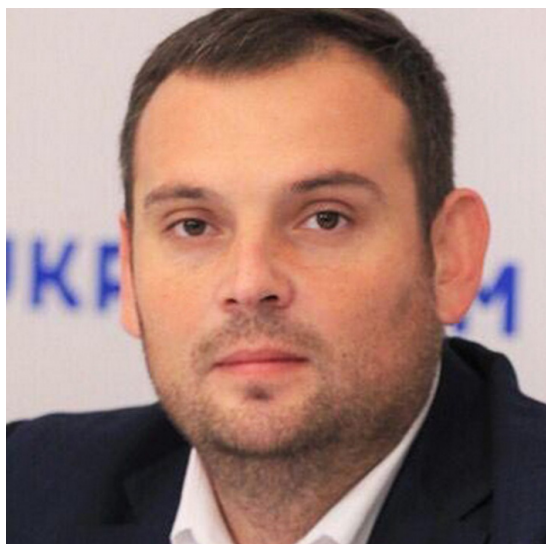
Cash assistance is critical in times of crisis to help families be able to purchase key items and supplies in the local market. The benefits of cash assistance are many, and include the flexibility it offers to a wide population of people who have different needs, and changing needs over time. At the same time, this assistance helps inject cash back into the local economy – helping local markets, shop owners and others to recover.

Caritas Ukraine provided **124,208 people** with multi-purpose financial (cash) assistance, in the amount of **UAH 2,220 (EU)** for three to six months. This included:

- Emergency tranches of payments for people living near areas of active hostilities and in the newly de-occupied territories, as well as people leaving dangerous regions and who had recently arrived in a new place.
- Stabilization tranches covering six-months for families who have moved to safe regions of Ukraine and trying to rebuild their lives there.

"Our model of providing assistance in the context of the humanitarian crisis, is imbued with protection principles and complemented by special services aimed at overcoming the main humanitarian and social protection risks. Crisis counseling in cases of threat to life and health, long-term social support through case management, psychosocial support, and primary legal aid are deeply rooted in our work with local communities. This enables us to provide services quickly, efficiently, comprehensively and help those in the most difficult situations. It is this approach that ensures efficiency and sustainability, which is very important for our society, both in times of war and after the victory."



RESPONSE TEAM

“Back in 2014, Caritas Ukraine started working in the liberated territories of Donetsk and Luhansk regions, delivering humanitarian aid. At first, people were quite wary of this help, not believing that someone cares about them unselfishly, remembers them and wants to help.

Caritas has further developed its humanitarian response strategy, including rapid response in newly liberated territories, and broader communication with international partners, enabling a deep and far reaching response to needs. The organizational and resource capacities of local Caritas organizations have been significantly strengthened over the past year. We understand that after the liberation of the territories, we will need to work on healing the wounds that this war has caused to people. We are preparing for this intensively.”



SUPPORT FOR CHILDREN, YOUTH AND



The full-scale invasion has had a devastating impact on the lives and futures of many Ukrainians, but perhaps the most damaging is among children. They have been deprived of stability, security, homes, families, friends, schools and, of course, childhood. Caritas Ukraine was able to build off its unique experience in strengthening the resilience of children affected by the war, from the number of projects it supported in the buffer zone in the east of the country between 2016-2021.

THIS YEAR, CARITAS UKRAINE EFFORTS FOCUSED ON THE FOLLOWING:



CHILD FRIENDLY SPACES

Caritas Ukraine supported 52,087 people - children and parents – with services provided in 53 Child-Friendly Spaces across 30 local Caritas centers. Child-Friendly Spaces uses the Safe Space resilience-building methodology developed by the Center for Mental Health at the National University of Kyiv-Mohyla Academy, and approved by the Ministry of Education and Science of Ukraine for use in schools.

SERVICE CENTERS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH



Service Centers offer received daycare, informal educational activities, leisure activities, training in basic life skills and psycho-social support for parents and youth. During the year, the project reached 1,155 children and 768 parents. Caritas psychologists provide diagnoses and consultations to relieve stress and socialize in a new environment. A key focus of the counseling and services is to reducing conflict, alienation and overcoming barriers to communication, optimizing self-esteem and self-confidence.

"My child runs to the Caritas Poltava center with pleasure. She already has friends and girlfriends here. It helps her to feel that life has not changed." - Maryna Kharchenko, Kharkiv resident, living in Poltava.

SAFE SPACES

The Safe Space program helps children with skills to re-establish contact, manage their reactions, and foster positive thinking and conflict resolution.



"After the Safe Space classes, my daughter became more open-minded and started to take up her hobby of dancing again. We had to move because of the war and it was very difficult for her to find friends, but thanks to the classes at Caritas, she made a friend (and developed strong coping skills). (Now) My daughter tells me what to do to reduce bad emotions. Together we choose pleasant things to do that make us feel better," says the mother of an 8th-grade pupil.

SPOTLIGHT ON PROJECTS



PSYCHOSOCIAL ASSISTANCE TO CHILDREN

Caritas Ukraine reached 7,932 children, parents and teachers engaged in 18 schools across Donetsk, Luhansk, Khmelnytskyi, Odesa, and Ternopil regions with assistance to adapt and navigate the changes in the war-affected educational context. Of the participants, 1,003 children participated in online classes. Caritas creates opportunities to engage the adults, of whom 886 parents and 402 teachers took part in activities.

STRENGTHENED ORGANIZATIONAL KNOWLEDGE IN YOUTH, CHILDREN AND FAMILY PROGRAMMING

Caritas Ukraine organized trainings, seminars and individual consultations for staff to accumulate and disseminate information in the field of youth engagement and volunteering, psychosocial support for children in stressful situations, and overcoming the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic and war.



SCHOOLBAG CAMPAIGN



Caritas Ukraine supported volunteers and community members to raise 15000 EUR to purchase backpacks and school supplies for children and youth in need.

CHILDREN'S CAMP-IN UKRAINE AND ABROAD

Teenagers were the backbone of children's groups at Caritas centers (100-150 children in each) and attended children's health camps in the Carpathians and abroad - in Italy, Austria and Poland.

"We could only dream that our child would have the opportunity to visit the camp, to recover physically and mentally after the horrors of war," said the mother of a student who attended a camp after fleeing to Lviv from Chernihiv.



HOME CARE

(or: CARE FOR THE ELDERLY AND HOMEBOUND)



Services include hygiene care and supplies; household living support; free rental of key rehabilitation equipment like wheelchairs, case and toilet chairs; accompaniment to social and medical institutions; calling a doctor and purchasing medications; and teaching self-care skills. Unfortunately, support to beneficiaries in Severodonetsk and Mariupol was suspended, and services in Kramatorsk were only partially provided.

Caritas Ukraine's Care for the Elderly and Housebound is the only high-quality comprehensive home-based care program in Ukraine, and the longest-running Caritas social program, having been operating continuously since 1998. All services are provided in accordance with the State Standard of Home Care and the State Standard of Palliative Care.





IN 2022, CARITAS UKRAINE:

Provided Home Care services in **17 cities**, benefiting **1,683 people**

Conducted **39,447** individual consultations

Provided **4,446** services related to rental and rehabilitation

20,808 home care visits conducted as part of the humanitarian response efforts

“Every day, according to the schedule, Caritas Borysav employees go from house to house to help, bring, listen, clean and ask, ‘How are you?’ But there is never too much care, especially for the elderly, mostly lonely people,” says Lidiia, who has been receiving help from the Home Care project for five years.



HELPING PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES



Caritas Ukraine has 19 social centers throughout Ukraine which support 280 people living with disabilities, and their families, with a range of self-care skills, social integration, occupational therapy, psychological support and family support. Services include:

- Improving the living standards of young people with special needs through their participation in the activities of social centers.
- Providing psychosocial support and assistance in overcoming social isolation and adaptation to life in communities.
- Development of creative and educational self-actualization of the wards to acquire new vital skills and social integration.
- Mobilization of communities and support of initiative groups of parents
- Involvement of students in state-specialized institutions in Caritas Ukraine program activities.
- Cooperation with local higher education institutions so that students gain practical skills in working with people with intellectual disabilities.

"I am inspired by the fact that our participants can share with me, trust me and get positive emotions from communication. Their experiences are very vividly manifested during art therapy the center's clients have drawn a lot before, but now their drawings have new colors and new storylines." - Nataliia Pykhalska, Head of the Leisure Center for People with Disabilities, Caritas Lviv

"We cannot know what he is thinking about, but he is really happy here, here he can sing, dance, draw, and he always asks when we will go to Caritas again. The war has turned everything upside down, everything has changed - our way of life and our plans." -Oksana, mother of Nazar, 32, who has Down Syndrome and receives assistance at the center.

SOCIAL SERVICES



MIGRANT SUPPORT

Caritas Ukraine has long supported migrants and people who are at risk of, or are recovering from, human trafficking. This programming began in 1992 and has continued and evolved in the heightened context of displacement and conflict. Services includes: Detection and identification of victims of human trafficking; comprehensive support for their reintegration in society and healing; and education for prevention.

DEVELOPMENT OF PARISH SOCIAL MINISTRY

108 parishes across Caritas Lviv, Kolomyia, Ivano-Frankivsk, Chernivtsi, Ternopil, Zhovkva, Stryi, Buchach, Kyiv and Drohobych have taken part in programs to help parishioners address problems in their communities. Also, more than 1,000 volunteers participate in the Social and Educational Volunteer Academy. In the process of training and development, parish communities have the opportunity to submit their project for a grant competition to receive further support for their activities.

MINI-GRANTS COMPETITION

Parishioners have the opportunity to learn how to research the social needs of the community, formulate social ideas and write a social project in order to receive financial support and start activities.

PARISH SOCIAL MINISTRY SCHOOL

Trainings are provided to increase the capacity of the parish community—specifically, their ability to effectively perform social ministry, understand the needs of the community, interact with community members, implement projects and attract resources for development. An important element is the mentoring of parish communities, and providing consultations on various issues throughout the process.



VOLUNTEER SUPPORT AND OUTREACH



Even before the war, Caritas Ukraine was a place for young people to start participating in volunteer initiatives. Since the beginning of the full-scale invasion, the need for volunteering has grown. The level of motivation of volunteers and the level of special knowledge, skills and abilities necessary to do good “professionally” has also increased. The Caritas Ukraine network includes more than 6,600 volunteers across Ukraine. Highlights of activities include:

SOVA VOLUNTEER ACADEMY (SOVA)

The volunteer academy is a project of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church’s Social Service and designed to assist in the professional training of volunteers to intensify social service in parishes. The Academy provides lectures and workshops in which participants deepen their knowledge of spiritual foundations, communications, fundraising, volunteer management, and other professional skills. Practical volunteer activities help the trainees develop a culture of volunteering, and take part in motivational events and team-building training.



THE VOLUNTEER SCHOOL

The volunteer school is aimed at active students who are interested in gaining practical experience through informal learning and the implementation of social projects. The program helps the students acquire knowledge and skills for volunteer work, and develop social activism.

CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY MOVEMENT

“Faith and Light” is a global movement of people with intellectual disabilities. Together with volunteers and mentors, they share their psycho-emotional state, organize various events, meetings and workshops, which help them socialize and spend time with benefits.

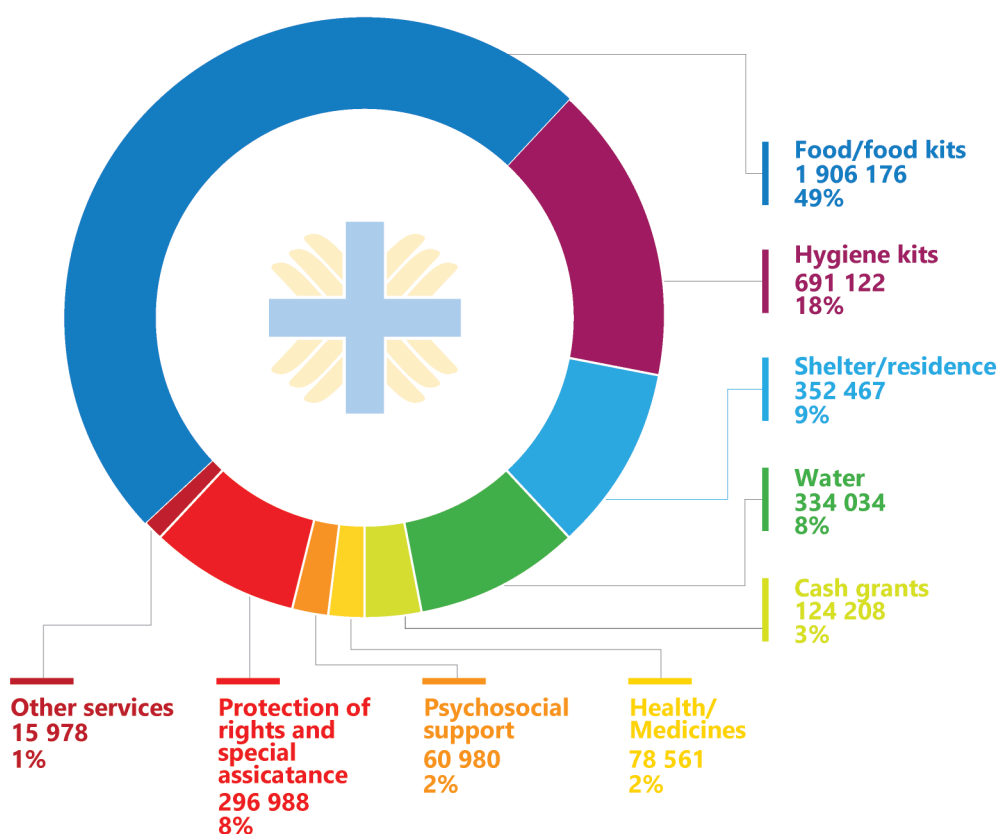

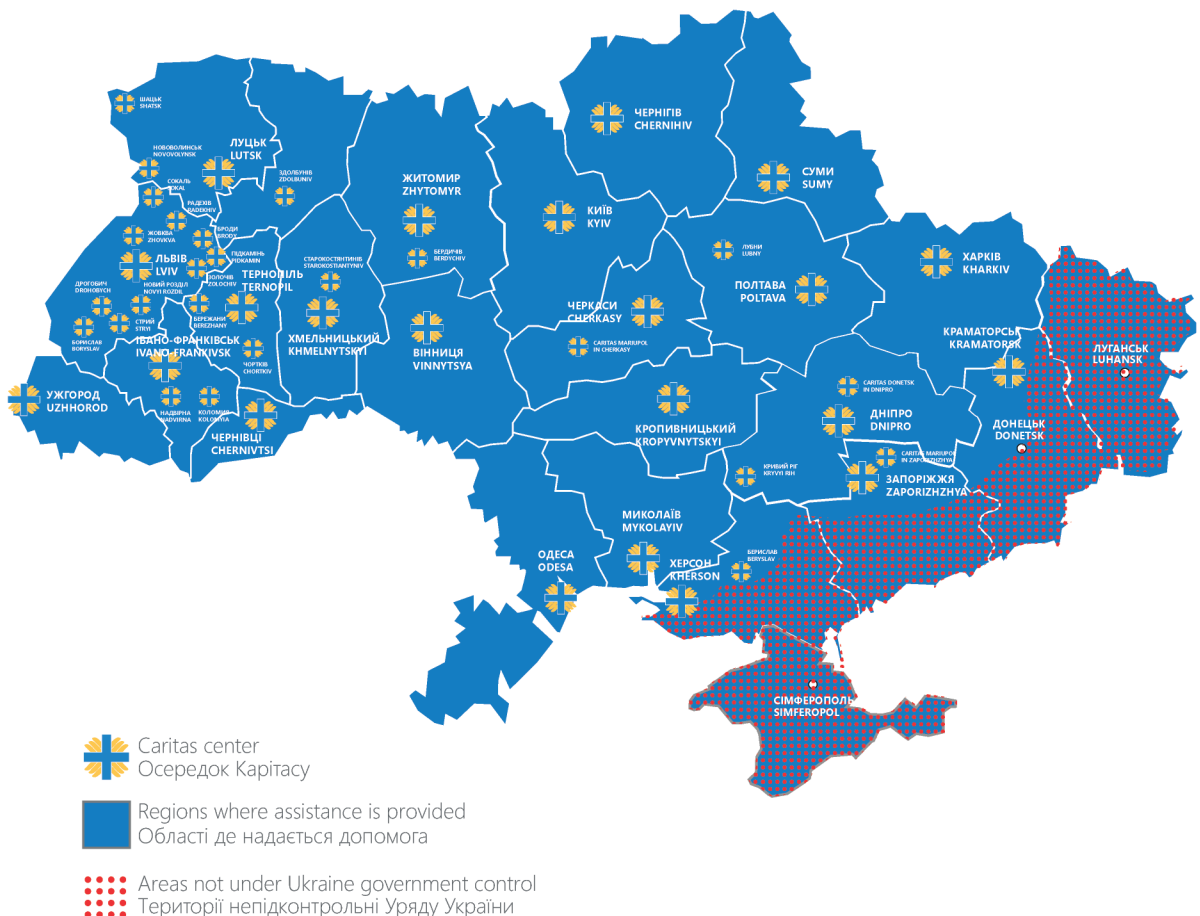
Caritas Ukraine network 2022

During 2022, the geography of Caritas humanitarian response was scaled to the entire territory of Ukraine, including the newly liberated territories, but excluding temporarily occupied territories. The nature of the response was adjusted according to the needs in each particular region.

Caritas Ukraine respond to the humanitarian crisis through:

- **42** Caritas centers.
- **448** hubs in the parishes of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church.
- **198** shelters for people affected by the war.
- **1550** employees working in local centers and the national office.
- more than **6000** volunteers were involved for different humanitarian activities from the beginning of war on community level.
